HIGHLIGHTS 2021-2022¹

he Institute for Community Engaged Research (ICER) connects researchers from a diverse range of disciplinary backgrounds. We share a commitment to research that supports diversity, equity, and social justice. The Institute facilitates the participation of community members, organizations, students (both graduate and undergraduate, domestic and international), and academics in undertaking effective research. It is a hub for building relationships, collaboration, and effective knowledge creation and exchange.

Despite another challenging year, ICER has pivoted to provide many of its regular services in a virtual environment. This annual report demonstrates the Institute's capacity and agility to overcome adversity, to refocus on our core mission in web-based spaces, and to continue to make a vital contribution to realizing the vision outlined in UBC's Strategic Plan - including developing a closer relationship with students in the CESCE IGS theme, working directly with our community partners on a range of projects, and contributing to developing cross-campus policies for addressing the climate emergency.

Both ICER and ICER Press received Work Study program funding, allowing us to hire several RAs this year. Renoir Gauvin, Madelaine Lekei, and Hanna Paul assisted the ICER press over the summer of 2021, with Dr. Fiona McDonald leading the Press initiative. From September to April, 2021-2022, Madelaine Lekei contribute her numerous skills to the Press. The Work Study program also support two RA students on the ICER Matchmaking Project a collaboration with UBC Studios Okanagan. Kelly Panchyshyn worked with us over the summer of 2021 as a videographer, interviewing community partners, students,

staff and faculty to create video profiles. From September, 2021 to March, 2022, Adam Kunis continued Kelly's work editing the videos and co-ordinating the launch of the Matchmaking project. We discuss these in more detail below.

- We will continue to pursue excellence in Community Engaged Research and growing the Institute to include, represent and support researchers and community partners working in our field of research.

We have continued to nurture relationships with other UBC Okanagan institutes and departments who work in the realm of community engaged research. We also continue to reach out and partner with a growing number of community organizations.

ICER researchers work in communities around the globe and throughout the Pacific Rim. We maintain active affiliations with many partner organizations. We have sustained our commitment to strong research partnerships that support knowledge creation and exchange. Partnerships which in turn promote equality, equity, and justice at the local, national, and international levels. As this Annual Report demonstrates, these broad objectives are clearly represented in the activities that ICER has initiated, supported and facilitated over the past year.

ICER PRESS

Message from the Director of ICER Press Dr. Fiona McDonald



April 1 2021- March 30, 2022

Over the past year, ICER Press has be active in expanding its editorial office to include a team of amazing Editorial Assistants, Editorial Consultants, and collaborators.

Between May-August 2021, three editorial assistants (Hanna Paul and Madi Lekei (funded by UBC Workstudy program) and Renoir Gauvin (funded by ICER)) were onboarded to the press and worked with Dr. McDonald and Joanne Carey to migrate the original ICER and CESJE Presses material to a new press website.

Dr. McDonald worked with a UK-based web designer to imagine a new accessible press website that allows for dynamic, multimodal publishing, and reflects the values of social justice and the honouring of publishing and working on unceded territory. The new website will go live in late-Fall 2022.

The editorial assistants from April 2021-March 2022 were beyond incredible in creating in-depth research and mobilizing as a team into the core values of the press. They worked in collaboration with Amanda Brobbel (Center for Scholarly Communication), Donna Langille (UBCO Library), Sandra Fox (formerly of ORS), and others from UBCV to create new guidelines for Open Access publishing, submission guidelines, and preparing the groundwork for an new editorial board that is currently being established.

Added to this, the ICER Press team presented at two conferences on the new press, first in October as part of UBC's Open Access Week, and in December, at an international digital humanities conference. In January 2022, we began conversations with Dr. Jeannette Armstrong to create a nsyilxcən Language Series (soon to be renamed) in the press and prepared a new UBC Workstudy position for that role which was successful.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

This past year, ICER has directly engaged in and supported a number of important community initiatives and events.

ORGANIC BC ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Organic BC is an ICER partner. It is a British Columbia based grassroots network of organic certifiers, farmers, processors and consumers. It seeks to raise the standards for organic agriculture and transforming agriculture's impact on both the province and the planet. The current Executive Director (Eva-Lena Lang) is a past UBCO graduate student, recipient of the ICER graduate fellowship and strong supporter of ICER.

Following on last year's successful event, ICER was asked to partner again this year to host and facilitate their second virtual conference. We worked together with Michelle Tsutsumi the BC Organic Conference Coordinator, and with farmers Tristan Banwell and Jordan Marr, to deliver the conference




from within the Institute. The event was attended by over 168 participants and was heralded a success by Organic BC and their membership.

CITY OF VERNON HOMELESSNESS SURVIVAL GUIDE

The demand for housing in the City of Vernon has been steadily increasing each year. This has caused a declining vacancy rate and an increase in the cost of housing. As stated by the Vernon Housing Strategy, these low vacancy rates make it harder for people experiencing difficulties find secure housing. Given that the number of residents in Vernon is 43,315, that means that 3.5 people out of every 1,000 people are homeless, that ratio is higher than Penticton, Nanaimo, and Greater Victoria.

ICER have developed a real-time mobile application based on the Vernon Homelessness Survival Guide (a paper based tool) that can be used by unhoused people and support providers to identify and access important resources and services in the city. We have partnered with the Social Planning Council of the North Okanagan, Vernon By-law, the Vernon Branch of the Okanagan Regional Library and the Kelowna Homelessness Research Centre (who funded the project).



OUTREACH ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

We have continued to reach out into the community through a series of notable projects and ongoing events.

STARTING A CONVERSATION SPEAKER SERIES

Increasingly UBC Okanagan is inviting distinguished speakers to our campus to share their research. This is greatly enriching the research ethos on our campus. However, often these talks are formal in their nature and delivery, and there is little opportunity for graduate students and faculty members to engage in a dialogue with these visitors. The Starting a Conversation series is an opportunity for ICER members and affiliates to share their research ideas, methodologies, questions or findings with an interested audience of students, peers and community members in a relaxed and collegial atmosphere.

Because of this relaxed and engaging format, we are increasingly using the 'Starting a Conversation' Speaker Series to also showcase important research being done by our faculty, graduate students and community partners. In 2021-2022, ICER hosted six speakers as a part of the series.

- Madelaine Lekei, 2020-21 ICER scholarship recipient. Digitally Bound: Following the Threads of Digital Communities. (Mar. 24, 2022)

 Liz Blakeway, Land to Table, 2021 ICER Community Grant recipient. Fostering Lumby Community Food Connections in a Time of COVID and Climate Disruption. (Mar. 29, 2022).

Each discussion was held virtually and was attended by up to 26 students, staff, faculty and community members. We resumed the number of Starting a Conversations events occurred this year; however, we think that Zoom fatigue perhaps led to fewer participants than last year's recording setting number. This year 96 participants attend the talks.



WEBINARS

We continue to develop our hybrid and virtual webinar format and take the experiences learned during the pandemic and apply it to increasing attendance at all our events. This year we collaborated with the Kelowna Sustainability Coalition to put on our first joint event - a panel that discussed the 'Truths, myths, and Kelowna's transportation master plan'. It was a well attended event (with over 40 participants).



NETWORKING ACTIVITIES AND FUNDING

ICER exists to enhance university and community engagement. Partnerships include activities such as joint research projects, funding agreements, student supervision, and knowledge exchange.

LAND TO TABLE PARTNERSHIP - UBCO WORK STUDY: LOCAL FOOD CHAMPION

Dr. Mary Stockdale and ICER partnered with Land to Table (L2T) on a successful grant from the UBC Okanagan Work Study which will run from May 2022- April 2023.

L2T is a regional network of community partners working to create a prosperous, sustainable and accessible food system. This grant will enable a student to work with the L2T and the Community Service Learning program to greater awareness among the student population of the importance of supporting local food initiatives on composing and introducing them to the concept of the food value chain, from farmers to processors, distributors, food services, and consumers, that may enable these partners to overcome challenges to local food procurement.

ICER GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP

2021-22 saw ICER continue its commitment to supporting students in their pursuit of community engaged research through its student scholarship program. This program provides two graduate students with a \$1,000 research fellowship to help them undertake their graduate research. The award is also open to exceptional undergraduate students undertaking undergraduate research. In addition to offering students financial

support, scholarship recipients are also invited to talk about their research during the Starting the Conversation lunch-time speakers series. Students can chose to give a paper presentation, discuss their methods or findings, or undertake some other form of public engagement with ICER's membership.. The 2021-22 recipients are:

- Hanna Paul for her project: Métis Moon Time and Decolonizing Métis Women's Body Image. Supervised by Dr. Fiona McDonald
- Tori Stranges for her project: Intimate Partner Violence Related Brain Injury in the Queer Community. Supervised by Dr. Paul van Donkelaar.

We look forward to hearing about their community engaged research projects later in the year.

ICER MATCHMAKING PROJECT: BRIDGING COMMUNITY RESEARCH INTERESTS

PROJECT SUMMARY

The Matchmaking Project was created to strengthen community-university research relationships during the pandemic. Each participant in the project recorded a video interview where they shared areas for potential research collaboration. Stakeholders represented in this study include Okanagan non-profits as well as UBCO students, faculty, and campus services. Our goal was to connect campus and community stakeholders and to encourage collaborations.

Creation and marketing of video interviews which strengthened community relations and promoted collaborative opportunities between local non-profits and University of British Columbia Okanagan students, faculty, and campus services.
